pre-trip coursework

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1. Student Government classroom discussion:

- Students to discuss the following:
 - √ The role of student government/council within a school body.
 - ✓ The method by which individuals in their school become members of student government/ council.
 - ✓ What are the qualifications needed for membership in the student government/council?
 - √ What are the qualifications for leadership roles within student government/council?
 - √ How are issues brought before the student government/council?
 - √ How are issues resolved by the student government/council?
 - √ What are the benefits of having a student government/council?

2. Living in the New World Activity:

- Students to divide into small teams of 4 or 5.
- Each team to research one of the following topics:
 - √ Mayflower Compact-Its relationship to written constitutions
 - \checkmark Stamp Act-Why was it considered such a radical change from previous taxing policy
 - √ Slavery-Its role in Colonial America
 - √ French and Indian War-Its relationship to the American Revolution
 - √ Sons of Liberty–Their role in Colonial protests
- Discuss how these issues affected the formation of the United States of America.

3. Map Activity:

- Students to create a map of the territorial acquisitions of the United States.
- Students to label on the map the following:
 - \checkmark The original 13 states
 - / When additional states were admitted to the Union
 - ✓ Which states were "free" and which were "slave"
- Students to research what challenges/problems were created by the acquisition of new territory.
 - √ Slavery in the new territory
 - √ How the acquisition of a territory affected the relationship of the United States and other countries
 - \checkmark The challenges of governing a rapidly expanding nation
- Students to discuss how the expansion of the United States affected American life.



post-trip assessment

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At the conclusion of the Disney Youth Education Discovering the American Spirit experience, have each student do the following:

- 1. Identify the four elements of story and apply them to historical contexts.
- 2. Discuss the impact of the American westward expansion upon slavery and succession issues.
- 3. Articulate the qualifications necessary to be president of the United States.
- 4. Articulate the importance of representation in the American government.
- 5. Discuss the issue of representation as it was debated in the Constitutional Convention.
- 6. Articulate a contribution for each of the first eighteen presidents of the United States.
- Discuss how written documents such as the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and the presidential oath of office play a vital role in the decision making process of governmental bodies and leaders.
